

WINTER SAFETY! Keeping pets warm and safe during chilly-to-freezing winter months!

As winter settles in, Animal Humane Society urges pet owners to think twice when letting pets outside for extended periods of time. Temperatures below freezing along with wind chill can prove deadly for our domesticated pets. Keep your pets safe during the blistering cold winter months with these tips.

Indoor pet tips:

- During severe weather, dogs should be let out only to relieve themselves. Cats should be kept indoors at all times.
- Remove ice, salt and caked mud from your pet's paws and coat immediately.
- Before walks, <u>put Vaseline or doggie shoes on your dogs' paws to protect him/her</u> from sidewalk salt and chemicals; wipe the Vaseline off when back inside.
- Make sure your pet's bed is not on the floor in a cold or drafty area of your home.
- Indoor dogs typically receive less exercise during cold weather and therefore may require fewer calories. Feed smaller portions in order to avoid weight gain. Keep them busy with indoor brain games.

Outdoor pet tips:

- Several state laws govern all companion animals be provided shelter from the elements. In severe weather, allow your pet to be in your house or garage.
- Outdoor pets typically need more food in cold weather because they must burn more calories to keep warm.
- Check for frostbite, especially on paws and ears.
- Make sure your pet's water is never frozen.
- Keep an eye out for and clean up all antifreeze spills one lick of the sweet-tasting fluid can be fatal to an animal.
- Cats have been known to climb onto vehicle engines for warmth. Knock on the hood of your car before starting the engine if you suspect your cat could be inside.
- Watch for signs of hypothermia weak pulse, dilated pupils, decreased heart rate, extreme shivering, pale or blue mucous membranes, body temperature below 95 degrees, stupor and unconsciousness. Consequences of extreme hypothermia may include neurological problems including coma, heart problems and kidney failure.

Mask-Eating Dogs! Beware!!!

Many people have gotten used to wearing a face mask during the pandemic, but some may give little thought to what happens when their masks are lying around the house, or dropped outside. Masks may be left on a table, chair, or countertop, and they may smell like something you've just eaten. They may have been dropped on the sidewalks or streets, or in parking lots, and your dog could easily gobble up a thing or two while you're not looking.



It's really not unusual for dogs to eat things they shouldn't, and, as we know, dogs will play with or chew on just about anything. In most cases, our doggies will be fine, but there are times when the things they've eaten can make them sick. This can certainly happen when a dog eats a face mask.

Face Masks Can Cause Intestinal Blockage in Dogs

As you might expect, eating a mask can lead to very serious medical problems for your dog. If your dog happens to swallow the mask and then vomits it out soon after, they should be OK. But if the mask makes it through and hits the intestines, it can become stuck there and cause an intestinal blockage. This is condition is typically a medical emergency, and if not promptly treated it can lead to death. If you suspect or know that your dog has swallowed a face mask, then be sure to call the vet as soon as possible.

Symptoms of an Intestinal Block in Dogs

Here are the symptoms your dog may develop with an intestinal blockage:

- Vomiting
- Weakness
- Diarrhea
- Loss of appetite
- Dehydration
- Bloating
- Abdominal pain/swelling

And, hey... Throwing that mask away? Please: CUT THOSE STRINGS! If you notice any of these symptoms, you should call the vet right away. The prognosis is good for dogs that receive prompt medical treatment, but surgery may be required.

We are offering the following services at this time:

Curbside Care: We ask for you to remain in your car and call the clinic at 257-4144 to check in for any appointments or to drop off pets for boarding. We will come out to your car to get your pet and bring them into the clinic.

- Cats <u>must</u> be in a secure carrier and dogs must be on leashes.
- > Credit cards can be taken over the phone and cash can be collected curbside.
- Telemedicine: We may be able to provide some medical care via phone/texts/etc. for certain conditions that would alleviate the need for a visit to the clinic. Our regular prices will apply to these services if provided. Please call to see if your pet qualifies for this service.
- Prescriptions/Refills, Heartworm/Flea Treatments/Prescription Food: You may pay for your prescription over the phone or at curbside and we will bring it to your car. Please call ahead for all prescription refills.
